Professor Catherine J. Jones

Volume 26 of the Western New England Law Review is dedicated to Professor Catherine Jones, who was taken from us this year.

She was a member of the faculty board of advisors to this law review, and it is a better journal for her expertise, counsel, and great confidence in its editors. Prior to her passing, the Student Bar Association recognized Professor Jones' importance to the Law School by renaming the Professor of the Year Award the Catherine J. Jones Professor of the Year Award, in addition to making her its first recipient.

Professor Jones' teaching was principally in torts, bioethics and family law. She was a widely published author and panelist on subjects ranging from medical malpractice and bioethics to child custody and the right to die.

Professor Jones previously worked as a law clerk in superior and district courts in Pennsylvania and as chief law clerk in the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania. She had a B.A. from Gettysburg College, a J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center, and an LL.M. from Yale Law School.

Professor Jones was the consummate educator—a teacher, mentor and friend. Her importance and contribution to the law school community simply cannot be put into words. She is, and will continue to be, greatly missed.
